## **NEW BUSINESS:**

### **APPROVE/Proclamation for Black History Month**

Supervisor Guerrero read the Proclamation for the record. Supervisor Guerrero asked for a motion to approve the Proclamation for Black History Month. Motion was made by Trustee Gavin. Motion was seconded by Trustee Washington. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>4</sup> Mr. Ernest Crim III, Mr. Ernest Crim III, a 15-year resident of Joliet and a former teacher at Joliet Central High School for 10 years, who is currently best described as a public educator, activist, and author, came to the podium. Mr. Crim thanked the board for the opportunity to be present and for the gracious declaration and acknowledgment, noting that he recognized that a lot of thought was put into the Proclamation. Mr. Crim stated that for such a time as this, it is very necessary and needed for government entities to express unconditional support for Black history and for the Black community. Mr. Crim began his remarks with acknowledging and listing out the Indigenous people and tribes whose ancestral lands Joliet Township now resides on. Mr. Crim also acknowledged Eric Lurry and those who have lost their lives in police custody and in interactions with ICE, naming Keith Porter as one of the victims of a killing by an ICE agent. Mr. Crim shared national and local Black history and spoke on the importance of Black History. Mr. Crim closed his remarks with a quote from Carter G. Woodson's book, *The Miseducation of the Negro*, which states, "The same educational process which inspires and stimulates the oppressor with the thought that he is everything and has accomplished everything worth while, depresses and crushes at the same time the spark of genius in the Negro by making him feel that his race does not amount to much and never will measure up to the standards of other peoples."

Treasa Howard Johnson, the Director of Administration of History on Wheels, came to the podium to thank Joliet Township Government on behalf of History on Wheels founder, Luther Johnson, and the History on Wheels board for the Proclamation. Ms. Johnson stated that they are honored to be recognized in this way and shared that the mission of History on Wheels has always been to preserve and uplift the legacy of African Americans who have served in the military, not only in times of war but throughout history and till present day. Ms. Johnson went on to state that to have the History on Wheels work acknowledged by their local government during Black History Month reminds them that they are not alone and affirms that the stories we share, the stories of struggle, sacrifice and service, truly matter to this community. Ms. Johnson expressed that History on Wheels looks forward to soon opening their doors to the African Descendants Military and Historical Museum and to continuing to bring educational and cultural celebrations as well as living history to the people of Joliet.

Judy Easley, the President of the Joliet Chapter of the NAACP, came to the podium to share remarks on the Proclamation. Ms. Easley stated that she is honored to stand before everyone as we recognize Black History Month, a time to reflect on our past and recommit ourselves to a more just future. Ms. Easley went on to assert that Black history is American history and it is a story of resilience, leadership, and progress in the face of adversity. Ms. Easley shared that from those who endured enslavement and segregation to the trailblazers who advanced civil rights, education, and opportunity, Black Americans have helped move this nation closer to its founding ideals, highlighting the critical role that the NAACP has played in this progress. Ms. Easley spoke on the history of the NAACP and that for more than a century, the organization has advocated for civil rights, equal justice and full civic participation, turning the lessons of history into action through legal advocacy, community engagement and voter empowerment. Ms. Easley stated that the acceptance of this Proclamation should serve not only as a moment of recognition, but also as a call to learn, engage, and continue the work of equity and inclusion, not just this month, but every day. Ms. Easley expressed appreciation to Joliet Township Government for the honor and for its ongoing commitment to recognizing and advancing Black history.

Karl Ferrell, a community organizer, member of the leadership board of Equity and Transformation (E.A.T.), and President of the Will County Chapter of Black Lives Matter Grassroots, came to the podium to thank Joliet Township Government for the Proclamation. Mr. Ferrell stated that this was the first time locally that he has heard any form of government say the phrase, "Black lives matter" and expressed appreciation for the acknowledgment. Mr. Ferrell expressed that Black history is currently being erased, particularly within school curriculums in southern states, and emphasized that "you can not heal what you refuse to acknowledge." Mr. Ferrell spoke on the Black history of Joliet dating back to 1852. Mr. Ferrell reiterated that the Proclamation represents a significant step forward, noting that no other governmental body in Joliet has taken this action before. By passing this Proclamation, Mr. Ferrell hopes it will inspire other local governments to follow suit and continue moving in

the right direction, ensuring that every form of government in Joliet acknowledges Black History Month as progressively as Joliet Township. Mr. Ferrell concluded by stating that we have come far, but that we still have so much farther to go.

Trustee Washington shared remarks about the Joliet African American Historic Context Study project and its relationship to the Proclamation. Trustee Gavin spoke on local and national Black history and leaders along with the history of the National Hook-Up of Black Women, Inc. and their connections to national Black leaders.

#### **APPROVE/Proclamation for World Day of Social Justice**

Supervisor Guerrero read the Proclamation for the record. Supervisor Guerrero asked for a motion to approve the Proclamation for World Day of Social Justice. Motion was made by Trustee Adamowski. Motion was seconded by Trustee Gavin. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>5</sup>

#### **APPROVE/Resolution No. 2026-02 Designating Open Meetings Act Designees**

Supervisor Guerrero introduced the new business item. Supervisor Guerrero shared the list of Open Meetings Act Designees within the Resolution. Supervisor Guerrero asked for a motion to approve Resolution No. 2026-02 Designating Open Meetings Act Designees. Motion was made by Trustee Gavin. Motion was seconded by Trustee Adamowski. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>6</sup>

#### **APPROVE/Resolution No. 2026-03 Ratifying the Elimination of Certain Funded Positions due to Budget Constraints and Operational Necessity**

Supervisor Guerrero introduced the new business item and provided context on the Resolution. Supervisor Guerrero asked for a motion to approve Resolution No. 2026-03 Ratifying the Elimination of Certain Funded Positions due to Budget Constraints and Operational Necessity. Motion was made by Trustee Washington. Motion was seconded by Trustee Gavin. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>7</sup>

#### **ADOPT/Ordinance No. 420-2026 Regulating Weeds, Grass, Bushes, Trees, Ponds; Establishing Fees for Liens and Releases; Designating Authorized Officials; and Repealing Ordinance No. 381-2022 and Resolution No. 2002-7**

Supervisor Guerrero introduced the new business item and gave an overview of the Ordinance. Supervisor Guerrero asked for a motion to adopt Ordinance No. 420-2026 Regulating Weeds, Grass, Bushes, Trees, Ponds; Establishing Fees for Liens and Releases; Designating Authorized Officials; and Repealing Ordinance No. 381-2022 and Resolution No. 2002-7. Motion was made by Trustee Gavin. Motion was seconded by Trustee Adamowski. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>8</sup>

#### **APPROVE/Community Grant: National Hook-Up of Black Women, Inc. – Joliet Chapter**

Supervisor Guerrero introduced the new business item. Supervisor Guerrero asked for a motion to approve Community Grant: National Hook-Up of Black Women, Inc. – Joliet Chapter for \$1,000. Motion was made by Trustee Gavin. Motion was seconded by Trustee Adamowski. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>9</sup>

#### **REVIEW/Community Grants: Including You, Inc.; The Diversity of Youth Corp; Forevermore Mind Body & Soul; Northern Illinois Food Bank**

Supervisor Guerrero introduced the community grants for review. Supervisor Guerrero brought up revising the community grant application process for the new fiscal year and asked for feedback from the board. Discussion ensued. With no further discussion, Supervisor Guerrero proceeded to the reports section of the meeting.

#### **REPORTS:**

##### **Lead Transportation Coordinator, Leonardo Haro**

The Lead Transportation Coordinator was not present to give his report at the meeting, but shared his report prior to the meeting that stated the following: Despite cold temperatures, the Transportation Department continued to serve the community throughout the month of January. The drivers completed a total of 854 trips, including 63 trips for Will Grundy Medical Clinic, 360 trips for Family Guidance Centers, and 263 senior trips. The Transportation Department also supported The Victory Center

with senior group outings on four occasions during the month. In addition, two additional seniors were added to the food box delivery list for Holsten Human Capital Development, bringing the total to 154 food box deliveries for seniors during the month of January. Lastly, on January 16th, the entire Transportation team completed the NARCAN training.

**General Assistance Director, Patricia Venziano**

The General Assistance Director reported that the Bilingual Caseworker attended the State of the District Address at Joliet West High School. The General Assistance Department held their LIHEAP event on January 21st and will host the next LIHEAP event on February 18th from 9:00AM to 1:00PM. The General Assistance Department began the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program, with nearly 200 tax packets distributed and 51 returns completed to date.

**Animal Control Director, Whitney McGill**

The Animal Control Director was not present to give her report at the meeting, but shared her report with the board prior to the meeting that stated the following: January was a stable month focused on maintaining consistent daily operations and animal care following the busy end of the year. The Animal Control team continued to provide high-quality care, medical follow-up, and adoption services while ensuring facility needs and staffing coverage were met. Intake and adoption activity remained steady and within seasonal expectations for the Animal Control Department. In addition, all required regulatory reporting was completed, including submission of the DEA Controlled Substance reports and the Illinois Department of Natural Resources Trapping report. During the month of January, time was also spent reviewing procedures, addressing routine maintenance needs, and preparing for upcoming months that typically see increased activity. Supervisor Guerrero added that the Township is planning flooring improvements at the Animal Control building.

**Finance Director, Ivan Diaz**

The Finance Director reported that he has been working on the community convener grant and submitted the continuation for the grant. The Finance Director shared that the State automatically renewed the grant in the amount around \$660,000. The Finance Director anticipates that February will be a slower month than January.

**Highway Commissioner, Vincent Alessio**

The Highway Commissioner reported that the Road District has been busy with salting. An emergency icing incident on a road occurred on Sunday and the Road District staff responded accordingly. The Highway Commissioner reported that there is a solar farm that the Road District is working on in collaboration with the Sheriff's Department. At the Road District Office, the staff have been refurbishing old trailers to avoid purchasing a new trailer and to save money in the long run. The Highway Commissioner shared that he had a meeting with the City of Joliet's Water Department with plans of developing an intergovernmental agreement. The Highway Commissioner went on to share what the intergovernmental agreement would cover and asked the board if they would like the intergovernmental agreement placed on an upcoming agenda for approval. Trustee Gavin inquired whether the Road District currently has similar intergovernmental agreements. The Highway Commissioner responded that a similar agreement exists with the Township. Trustee Gavin asked the Township attorney if the Highway Commissioner needed to put the intergovernmental agreement on the agenda for the board's approval. The Township's attorney answered by stating that it was not required for the Highway Commissioner to receive the board's approval for the intergovernmental agreement. The Highway Commissioner expressed that placing the intergovernmental agreement on the agenda would be for transparency purposes with the board and for the public. The Highway Commissioner indicated plans to put the intergovernmental agreement on an upcoming agenda for review.

The Highway Commissioner reported that a salt bid opening was held in December, however, no bids were received. Although additional salt was anticipated at the time of December's bid opening, it was ultimately not needed, and current salt supplies have been sufficient for the Road District. The Highway Commissioner stated a preference to have a salt contract in place before April 1st and anticipates going out to bid again in March. The Highway Commissioner went on to report that the Road District met with the engineers to discuss resurfacing projects. The Highway Commissioner mentioned the \$100,000 grant that the Road District received from the State of Illinois and acknowledged the assistance of Representative Larry Walsh Jr. in securing the funds. The Highway Commissioner shared that the grant funds are expected to be received shortly and will support the Road District's plans for upcoming projects. The Highway Commissioner noted that January and February are typically slower months, allowing the Road District to focus on planning. The Highway Commissioner reported that the upcoming budget includes plans to purchase a new truck and a road widener. The Highway Commissioner explained the type of work the road widener will enable the Road District to complete.

### **Tax Assessor, James Brenczewski**

Tax Assessor Brenczewski reported that the Assessor's Office has been addressing approximately 100 property tax complaints, noting that this is slightly higher than usual. The Assessor acknowledged the financial constraints many residents are facing and pointed out that it is understandable that residents are seeking to reduce their property taxes. The Assessor's Office has been successful in defending the majority of the complaints filed. Assessor Brenczewski stated that in cases where he feels uncertain about their ability to win, the Assessor contacts the resident directly to reach an agreement, which has resulted in positive outcomes. Assessor Brenczewski stated that Joliet Township residents are very kind, which has been helpful in the overall process. Additionally, the Assessor's Office has been reviewing properties to verify that no changes have been made. The Assessor shared that if unpermitted improvements, such as the addition of a garage, are identified, staff conduct field visits, photograph the changes, and notify the resident that the property's assessed value will increase accordingly. Assessor Brenczewski concluded that, aside from these matters, operations have been proceeding as usual and noted that the Office's busy season will be starting soon.

### **Program and Policy Coordinator, Tyler Giacalone**

The Program and Policy Coordinator reported that he joined the Bilingual Caseworker at the State of the District Address. The Program and Policy Coordinator also reported that he has been collaborating with Holsten Human Capital Development to establish a consistent schedule for the food pantry pop-up events at the Louise Ray Community Center. The next food pantry pop-up event is scheduled for February 26th, with plans to host pop-up events on the last Thursday of each month. The Program and Policy Coordinator met with contractors regarding building improvements. Based on the current schedule, the Program and Policy Coordinator expects improvements in the board room to be completed prior to the next board meeting. The Program and Policy Coordinator expressed looking forward to revitalizing additional areas of the building that require attention and improvements. Lastly, the Program and Policy Coordinator shared that he is in the process of completing notary training.

### **Violence Prevention Community Convener, Gabriel Garcia**

The Violence Prevention Community Convener was not present to give his report at the meeting, but shared his report prior to the meeting. The report stated the following: For January, 27 incidents of violence have been tracked thus far, including 2 homicides and 2 GSWs. For February, there have been 7 incidents of violence thus far, including one violent homicide as of the morning of February 10, 2026. During the Department's most recent monthly meeting, they received verbal recognition from Illinois State Leadership, who oversees the RPSA/Flex Funds program. Joliet Township Government is leading the pack for response time, application processing, cross-region collaboration and communication, and innovative operations and community engagement strategies. The Department continues to see increases in application submission with more complete applications, which is reducing admin time in clarification responses. For January, there were 6 applications for approximately \$30,000 and for February, there are currently 13 applications being processed for up to \$65,000 in assistance. The Department is continuing implementation of its community awareness campaign to educate community members and service-providing organizations about the RPSA program and available Flex Funds resources. The Department remains actively engaged in planning prosocial youth engagement events as part of its preventative approach to their violence prevention work, in collaboration with several community partners. To conclude, the continuation application was submitted to the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS) for an automated extension through March 31, 2027.

### **TIBH Therapist Director, Haydee Martinez-Rosales**

The Trauma Informed Behavioral Health Therapist Director was not present to give her report at the meeting, but shared her report prior to the meeting that stated the following: The Behavioral Health team is currently in their third week of the Trauma-Focused group at Lincoln. The Department is serving 32 students across four groups, with 20 individual actively engaged clients in services at this time. Over the past month, the Trauma Informed Behavioral Health Therapist Director completed a mindfulness practice training to enhance her clinical work with adolescents. This week, the Trauma Informed Behavioral Health Therapist Director will be participating in a Trauma-Informed Care training series to further strengthen services.

### **Senior Liaison, Jeff Wallace**

The Senior Liaison reported that January is typically a short month for meetings, as many senior groups take time off during the month of January. The Senior Liaison stated that several groups have inquired about the absence of a senior service calendar and he has been trying to explain why a calendar is not currently available. The Senior Liaison has been distributing the tax preparation service flyers to senior groups. The Senior Liaison's written report that was given to the board included a list of

senior groups that the Senior Liaison attended along with a list of the upcoming senior groups that the Senior Liaison will attend before the next board meeting. Supervisor Guerrero reported that various third-party organizations have contacted him regarding hosting events at the Township office. Supervisor Guerrero indicated that the Township office may not be the best fit to host such events. Supervisor Guerrero stated that the Township will work to coordinate these requests with the senior groups.

#### **Clerk, Kendra Landfair**

Clerk Landfair reported that the Clerk's Office met with the State Archival Office to sign the updated application, which includes all required records and reflects the current records retention and disposal schedule. The Clerk shared that the Clerk's Office should receive the approved application from the State by April. Following approval of the Ordinances related to records retention and inventory at the previous board meeting, the Ordinances were distributed to Township staff and acknowledgement forms are in the process of being collected from all Township staff. Clerk Landfair shared that planning for the Annual Town Meeting has already begun and that the agenda item request packet for residents is available on the Township website. The Clerk acknowledged that mid-January marked the Deputy Clerk's three-month anniversary with the Township and that his performance review was completed. In response to recent staff changes, the Deputy Clerk updated the Township's organizational charts. The Deputy Clerk also made additional changes to the Township website, including adding information about public comment and updating the FOIA page of the website. Clerk Landfair reported that the Amended General Town Budget was filed with the County Clerk's Office on January 20th. Additionally, the list of Township staff and officials required to complete a Statement of Economic Interest (SEI) was submitted to the County Clerk. Clerk Landfair pointed out that all SEIs must be completed by May 1st. Last but not least, the Clerk worked with the Media Specialist on the January Proclamations and on the planning for employee spotlights in recognition of Black History Month.

Tax Assessor Brenczewski came to the podium to thank Clerk Landfair for administering his oath of office, as his term begins January 1st. Assessor Brenczewski's staff and wife were able to be present for his swearing in. Assessor Brenczewski expressed appreciation and stated that Clerk Landfair did a great job.

#### **Supervisor, Cesar Guerrero**

Supervisor Guerrero reported on building improvements, highlighting the work completed at the main building and the Louise Ray Community Center, as well as efforts to establish a more consistent schedule for the food pantry. Supervisor Guerrero reported that there has been interest from organizations in renting space at the Louise Ray Community Center and stated that he would discuss the matter individually with the Trustees. Supervisor Guerrero mentioned that he was invited to the Super Soul Bowl, but did not attend. Supervisor Guerrero recognized the Super Soul Bowl event, Pastor Lonnie Posley and the New Canaanland Christian Church. Supervisor Guerrero encouraged residents to participate in the comprehensive plan workshops for the African American Historic Context Study.

**CASH RECEIPTS:** Supervisor Guerrero asked for a motion to approve the cash receipts of \$1,081,517.16. Trustee Gavin motioned to place the cash receipts into their proper accounts for the period ending January 31, 2026. Motion was seconded by Trustee Washington. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>10</sup>

#### **FUND EXPENDITURES:**

##### **General Town Fund for January 2026: \$468,137.49**

Trustee Washington motioned to certify the expenditures and approve them for payment. Trustee Gavin seconded. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>11</sup>

##### **Capital Fund for January 2026: \$80.90**

Trustee Gavin motioned to certify the expenditures and approve them for payment. Trustee Adamowski seconded. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>12</sup>

##### **General Assistance Fund for January 2026: \$18,306.53**

Trustee Gavin motioned to certify the expenditures and approve them for payment.

Trustee Gavin motioned to certify the expenditures and approve them for payment.

Trustee Washington seconded. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>16</sup>

**ADJOURNMENT:** Supervisor Guerrero asked for a motion to adjourn. Motion was made by Trustee Washington. Motion was seconded by Trustee Adamowski. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.<sup>17</sup>
